Feelings and Friendships





Part of the learning that children experience in school is how to build strong friendships. It is important for them to know that they can be respectful and kind towards their friends, and also assertive with how they are feeling and their needs.

One way to do this is by using "I feel" statements. We might say, "When you do \_\_\_\_\_, I feel \_\_\_\_\_. I would like it if you \_\_\_\_\_." For example, a child might say to their friend, "When we are deciding what to do at recess and I don't get to share my ideas, I feel

frustrated. I would like a chance to share my ideas, too." This helps children to use less blaming words like "always" and "never" and focus on the impact of others' actions.

Here are some other scenarios you can practice at home with your child:

- Someone is disagreeing about the rules of a game with you
- Whenever your friend wins a game, they can't stop talking about their win
- A friend made plans without you at recess

While these statements may not solve the problem right away, they will help your child communicate their feelings.

### **Vacation Form Reminder and Homework Expectations**

If your family is planning to take your child out of school for 3 or more days a <u>Student Vacation</u> Form should be completed and submitted to the office. The form can be sent digitally to Melissa Lomibao, our office paraprofessional, at <u>melissa.lomibao@pccsk12.com</u> or it can be printed and sent to school with your child. Forms should be submitted 5 days before the start of the vacation.

When students are away from school it is difficult for the teacher to know the exact topics that will be covered each day during the absence. This is because classroom learning is fluid and based on student understanding of the topics and classroom discussions. ## **Information from P-CCS**

## Kindergarten Registration for the 2024-2025 School Year

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools is happy to announce that kindergarten registration for the 2024-2025 school year is open for all students living within district boundaries. P-CCS offers an exceptional and innovative education to students of all ages. The district is committed to developing capable, involved citizens who recognize that they are citizens of the world, use critical thinking skills, and are lifelong learners.

P-CCS offers traditional Kindergarten and Young 5s Kindergarten (Y5K) for students who will turn five years old on or before December 1.

Following the Michigan Academic Standards for Kindergarten, Y5K students will have the opportunity to move to first grade or remain at the Kindergarten level following the completion of their first school year with a recommendation from their teacher. The recommendation will be based on the level of developmental areas the student demonstrates. Both Kindergarten and Y5K classes are full-day, meaning their start and end times follow the elementary school schedule. Keeping students and staff safe at school is a top priority at P-CCS, and the district just added another layer of protection with its new district wide student/visitor management system. P-CCS recently partnered with Safe Visitor Solutions on a system that will screen and check-in/check-out all visitors. It also can be used by parents to check-in and check-out students. This system will be delivered through a kiosk located in the building's secure vestibule adjacent to the main office. Parents and visitors will be asked to sign into the kiosk, which will screen visitors against several databases to determine if they will receive access to the building.

Parents and visitors will be asked to present a government issued identification card (a State of Michigan Drivers License will be most common), which will be used to scan the barcode information on the back. At this time, parents are asked to ensure that the information on their identification matches what has been entered into MiStar to avoid any potential issues.

This system is completely confidential and no information will be shared. School and security officials will only be notified should a scan come back with a question. To read more about this new system, please click on this <u>link</u>.

### **NWEA MAP Growth Student Progress Report**

The most recent NWEA MAP Growth Student Progress Report will be available in the MISTAR Parent Connection on Monday, March 18. The following link describes how to locate your child's report and provides information and resources to help you understand their scores: <u>How to access and understand your child's NWEA student reports</u>.

A student's NWEA MAP Growth score is one data point that teachers use to understand how a student is performing and how to best support them. School and district leaders use assessment scores in combination with other information to monitor performance and progress at the grade, school, and district level. It is important to understand that a single assessment can't give students, families, and teachers all of the information that they need to determine what a student knows and how to best support their learning. Information is also gathered through classroom observation, student work, one-on-one interaction between student and teacher, as well as other formal and informal assessments throughout the year. Please discuss any questions that you have about your child's performance with their teacher. If you have trouble opening the report, please contact your child's teacher and they can print a copy for you.
