COMMUNITY

Established in 1890, the Plymouth-Canton Community School District (P-CCS) provides educational opportunities for approximately 18,000 students each year. The 54 square mile District includes Plymouth, Plymouth Township and parts of Canton, Northville, Salem and Superior townships. The District includes three high schools, five middle schools, 15 elementary schools, and an alternative education high school. Included in the District are shopping centers, modern subdivisions, industry and open farm land. The foundation allowance for the 2024-25 school year is \$9,608 per pupil.

P-CEP

The Plymouth-Canton Educational Park (P-CEP) sits on a 305 acre site and includes three Division 1 high schools: Canton, Plymouth and Salem. As the only Educational Park in Michigan, students are randomly assigned to a high school for counseling, records, sports and graduation. The wide variety of P-CEP course offerings, which are available to all students, allows our students to challenge themselves academically. Additionally, we offer five unique academies Arts, Business, International, STEM, and Virtual- to students who want to pursue a more focused course of study throughout their high school career. These academies have a limited enrollment and account for a small percentage of our total enrollment at the Park; currently, only 21% of seniors participate in the academies.

At P-CEP, we are proud of the academic achievements of our students and the unique setting in which they excel. There is no other environment like P-CEP in the nation that prepares students for the next level of education. The size (approximately 6,020 students) and diversity of our student body rivals that of many community colleges. Our students face challenges each day that students at other high schools do not. With classes often scheduled in multiple buildings, students must learn not only to navigate their way across campus, but also to adapt to having teachers and advisors in different locations. Our students' independence is established early on in their high school career as they acquire the skills necessary to be successful in such a large high school environment. The P-CEP experience develops students who are prepared for the challenges that await them in the future.

STEM Academy @ The Park
