P-CCS promotes Michigan fruits, veggies with free Summer Packs



This summer through mid-October,
Plymouth-Canton
Community Schools handed out free fresh fruits and vegetables to local families every week. The Summer
Harvest Packs were part of our effort to make nutritious local produce easily available to students.

To highlight the district's continuing focus on nutritious Michigan-based products, P-CCS is also the first school district in Michigan to successfully source affordable,

nutritious organic dry edible beans from a Michigan grower and processor through a partnership with the Michigan Bean Commission.

Families received a range of seasonal options, including tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, eggplant, zucchini, summer squash, carrots, beets, onions, herbs, cabbage, kohlrabi, snap peas and other fruits and vegetables.

The produce was sourced directly from Gateway Farm, a U.S. Department of Agriculture-certified organic, permaculture-inspired farm, as well as neighboring certified organic farms, including its sister farm, Plymouth Orchards & Cider Mill. Gateway and Plymouth Orchards are located in the district. In addition to produce, Summer Harvest packs included whole grain cookies from Troybased Dick & Jane Baking Co.

GET THE FACTS: WAYNE COUNTY REGIONAL ENHANCEMENT MILLAGE RENEWAL

The Wayne County Regional Enhancement Millage **renewal** will appear on your Nov. 5 ballot. The Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education voted to place this renewal on the ballot.

This renewal helps Wayne County students – including those who attend P-CCS – achieve, succeed, and prepare for in-demand careers. This millage was originally

approved by voters in 2016 and renewed in 2020. Details about this millage:



By law, 100% of the millage goes directly to local Wayne County school districts and eligible public school academies.



Funds are distributed equally per student.

If renewed, this millage will continue the less than 2-mill property tax each year for six years, beginning in 2028. A homeowner whose home is valued at \$100,000 (taxable value \$50,000) would continue paying about \$8 per month with the approval of

this renewal.

Students get head start on college in new program

P-CCS students who want to get an early start on college or a career can now do so at Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

Our Early Middle College program welcomed its first cohort of 25 students this fall. The program allows students to earn a high school diploma along with one of the following:

- 60 transferable college credits;
- ✓ An associate degree; or
- A professional certification.

Student Layelle Kassim enrolled in the program so she could complete high school and get a business degree

at the same time. Aliana Lara-Valerio said she transferred from a charter school specifically because of the high quality of P-CCS' Early Middle College program.

Starting in IOth or IIth grade, students have several options with our partner colleges, Schoolcraft College and Washtenaw Community College, including blending high school and college classes into a five-year plan.

Excellence, opportunities await in Career and Technical Education

At Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, Career and Technical Education programs allow students to explore their passions and gain valuable skills that will prepare them for college, jobs and rewarding careers. Here are just a few of our notable programs:

Engineering CAD (computer aided design)

Providing a solid foundation in manufacturing, engineering, construction and related fields, CAD students take lessons from math, science and civics and apply them in hands-on, project-based settings. They'll learn everything from 3D design and additive manufacturing to industry approved software and tools. Students will experience manufacturing, architecture, and mechanical, electrical and civil engineering.

Culinary arts

P-CCS' Restaurant Operations Class (ROC) is a fully licensed, full-service restaurant that is open to the public. Students

create a 40-plus item menu from scratch each day, learning in a real-world hands-on environment.

In the Culinary and Hospitality Explorations class, students can create a food business, forming

teams that create concepts, a mission, a demographic outline and a menu. The team then prepares a small plated item that is displayed in April.

DECA

P-CCS students in advanced marketing, business academy marketing, and marketing sales and services explore entrepreneurship

and business development through their participation in DECA, a cocurricular business organization with more than 260,000 members across the United States and other countries. P-CCS students have developed many interesting entrepreneurial and charitable projects through DECA. Students learn to set goals, develop plans, implement those plans and work as a team to achieve their objectives. DECA prepares our students to be professionally prepared, gives them experience to compete, and connect with businesses.

P-CCS elementary students surpass peers in U.S.

Elementary students in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools scored well above their peers nationwide in reading and math, according to national 2023-24 data compiled and analyzed by the Northwest Evaluation Association, a nonprofit organization that assesses student achievement.

Compared with other students nationwide,

students in kindergarten through eighth grade in a P-CCS school also met or exceeded predicted growth from fall to winter in reading and math, the NWEA data showed.

In every grade from kindergarten to eighth grade, P-CCS students outperformed the nation in reading and math.



Grade-level achievement among P-CCS students in math and reading also ranked high, ranging from the 71st percentile to the 86th percentile. The national norm fell within the 40th to 60th percentile.

P-CCS' success stems from several strategies, including:

- ✓ Rigorous support from instructional coaches and dedicated specialists at the elementary, middle school and high school levels
- ✓ Student teamwork in pre-K to the fifth-grade work to enhance literacy skills
- ✓ Support and resources targeted to site-based needs, which are identified early and closely monitored
- ✓ Highly qualified teaching staff

Canton HS grads take gold at national culinary contest

In the food and hospitality arena, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools continues to serve up national champions. **Charlie Salowich** and **Madeleine White** took top prizes at the National SkillsUSA Championship in the culinary and fine dining restaurant service categories. Charlie and Madeleine graduated from Canton High School in June.

As part of his SkillsUSA gold medal, Salowich received a full scholarship to both the **Culinary Institute of America** and **Johnson and Wales University**. Madeleine also won a full tuition scholarship to the **Culinary Institute of America**, as well as numerous prizes.

To win his gold medal, Salowich prepared a five-hour, five-course meal consisting of an appetizer, soup, two entrées and a dessert. He also completed a written assessment and demonstrated knife and butchery



skills. For her gold medal, White demonstrated exceptional table setting, napkin folding and fine dining service; excelled in a written technical assessment on terminology and best practices; and prepared a Caesar salad tableside.

SkillsUSA is the nation's foremost career tech and skilled trades education competition.

Making A Paw-sitive Impact



At Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, a few special schoolmates are helping students and staff stay ahead of the pack. With their puppy eyes and dogged determination, P-CCS' certified therapy dogs roam the hallways and visit classrooms to bring comfort, joy, a sense of security and more than a few smiles. Studies show therapy dogs in schools can help address students social and emotional needs: A 2019 National Institutes of Health study found that a therapy dog promotes positive feelings in a classroom. A University of California study linked therapy dogs in a classroom with higher rates of reading fluency. At P-CCS, our four-legged friends are part of the family – and a crucial member of our learning environment.

Meet Acey

At 6 months old, Acey is the newest addition to P-CCS' team of therapy dogs. An American-Lab mix, Acey is currently working on her Good Citizen

Certification and will soon be a certified therapy dog. Hulsing Elementary Principal Jennifer Chambers is Acey's "person." At the moment, Acey will be at Hulsing one day a week. Thank you to the Plymouth Community United Way for providing grant funding to purchase and train Acey.

Meet Echo

Echo is a 3-and-a-half-year-old yellow
Lab certified in obedience as well as
firearm and explosive detection.
Echo visits every school in the
district and loves every outing.
Echo's handler is Scott Hughesdon.
Echo was born in Croatia, entered the
United States through Germany and has

An update on P-CCS bond projects

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools is excited to announce the completion of several projects related to the bond that voters generously supported in 2020. Adding to dozens of upgrades that have been completed in the past year, these new projects will further enhance our students' learning and educational environment. Throughout our district, students, families and visitors will experience new gym and play areas, academic resources, athletic facilities and more. P-CCS is grateful for our community's support and we look forward to continue serving as good stewards of our resources, keeping the promises we have made to our community.

The Plymouth Natatorium and multi-purpose room addition is a 35,000-square-foot facility







- that makes our district stand out in Michigan. The addition consists of an 8-lane swimming pool with a diving well, a gymnasium, and a 2-story grand corridor.
- Isbister Elementary now has a new gym and two additional classrooms, thanks to a 9,333-square-foot addition.
 Isbister also has a new playground.
- East, Pioneer and West middle schools recently completed upgrades that added to the schools' welcoming environment, as well as enhancing security and safety.
- Pardon the dust as work ramps up on a third stadium at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park, which includes a new field, bleachers and running track. The work will also include a new 17,000-square-foot addition featuring a multi-purpose room and concessions.

Building for the future with Bosch STEM grant

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools (P-CCS) was awarded a \$48,000 grant from



longtime community partner Bosch Community Fund to further strengthen science, technology, engineering and math education for students in kindergarten through fifth grade. The grant will enable P-CCS to implement and integrate STEM lessons for students using LEGO kits designed to boost students' knowledge of and confidence in skills such as coding, robotics and computer science. The kits also help foster collaborative work among students and promote critical thinking and problem-solving skills. The program will be added into the Innovation Period.



Community dials up support for award-winning student radio station

Rotary Club of Plymouth donates \$200,000; Relentless Care Foundation by Community Financial Credit Union donates \$10,000 toward matching fund

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools' community partners continue to step up to generously support our students and their amazing work. The Rotary Club of Plymouth announced over the summer that it is donating \$200,000 to support upgrades to the station that will benefit students and listeners for years to come.

And just before the start of the 2024-25 school year, Relentless Care Foundation by Community Financial Credit Union announced a contribution of \$10,000 toward a matching fund. The generous donations bring P-CCS a step closer toward raising more than \$500,000 for the studio upgrades.

Rotary Club of Plymouth President **Chris Porman** said the donation reflects the organization's core mission of investing in education.

"By supporting the student radio station, we are providing a platform for students to gain hands-on experience in broadcasting, journalism, communication and media production," Porman said.
"The student radio station serves as a vital medium for fostering dialogue, promoting diverse perspectives, and amplifying voices that may otherwise go unheard. In an era when media consolidation can limit access to alternative viewpoints, supporting independent and student-run media outlets is crucial."

"Our world is changing rapidly. We need young people to find their voices and lead," said Tansley Stearns, Community Financial Credit Union president/CEO and RCF board member. "Community Financial is deeply committed to our partnership with P-CCS and helping 88.1 The Park expand its physical space. Allowing more students to find their voices in this important programming is core to our commitment to teachers, their students, and shaping the future of Michigan as a place the next generation wants to call home for years to come."





"The ability to tell stories that balance voices on different sides of an issue is an imperative skill for young minds. Radio is the perfect canvas for this learning," said **Matt Nahan**, RCF executive director. "We are incredibly proud to support 88.1 The Park's expansion plans."

The donations will help the station raise \$517,000 for upgrades to its studio at Salem High School. The project will include three new production studios, an interview studio, student workspace, and storage space. The upgraded studio will also improve access for people with disabilities.

Tuned in to excellence

For the seventh year in a row, the Michigan Association of Broadcasters recognized The Park as Michigan's top student-run high school radio station in 2024. The Park has been named Michigan's best student radio station every year since the 2017-18 school year. The award is the station's 13th since 2001.

Working at the radio station is an extracurricular activity for students and the skills they learn can inform them about future career options. Students ranging from high school freshmen to seniors work at 88.1 The Park doing everything from acting as department directors, on-air personalities, and working as news anchors and reporters.

SECURITY AT OUR SCHOOLS

At Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, we are committed to helping ensure all students and staff are physically, psychologically, and emotionally safe and represented at school. P-CCS has made robust investments in state-of-the-art security measures, strategies and resources. Our Security Operations Center, established in 2021, continues to grow, with new capabilities added every year. Currently, the SOC can monitor building entries and other key areas, access building control remotely and monitor all visitors, building lockdowns and area 911, among other capabilities.

Recent enhancements include:

- Weapons detections technology
- ✓ Armed assailant monitoring systems
- Communications integration with law enforcement and first responders



- ✓ Emergency call boxes throughout the P-CEP campus
- ✓ Lockdown emergency lights
- ✓ Threat assessment guidelines
- Training hundreds of P-CCS employees, including new hires, and providing refresher courses

Future projects include additional enhancements to security integrations and efforts to incorporate new technology into P-CCS emergency operations plans, additional radio and communications tools, and more.

Native American foundation provides grant for new Canton HS mascot

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools was awarded a nearly \$146,000 grant from the Native American Heritage Fund to support the rebranding of Canton High School's new mascot, the Cobras. Funding from the grant will be used to support the estimated cost of updating uniforms, logos and other paraphernalia related to the mascot rebrand.

Canton High School students started the process of renaming the school's mascot last year. After the P-CCS board approved the rebranding, Canton High School students conducted surveys of potential new names, before a majority of students chose Cobras in

November. The NAHF is a Michigan public body that distributes grants to schools, colleges and universities, and local governments to support initiatives to improve curricula and resources related to Native American issues, and mascot or imagery revisions.
